

Challenges

- Family
 - Unrelenting disasters
 - Competing priorities for limited resources
 - Fear of death
 - Social costs of seeking care
 - Inadequate navigation through a weak system
- Facilities (the system of care)
 - Limited focus on non communicable diseases
 - Lack of adequate human resources for education and screening
 - Lack of governmental diagnostic capacity
 - Lack of available surgeons, anesthesiologists, pathologists, oncologists

Challenges: 2010 earthquake, cholera, drought, tropical storms AND...Hurricane Matthew, Oct 2016



Over 60,000 families lost their houses, outside kitchens, livelihoods, crops and animals

Pamphile family of 6 barely getting by

Hundreds sought refuge in grottoes





145 MPH winds followed by 6 weeks of rain






Loss of access to health care, markets, schools, food and emergency services

Importance of understanding: knowledge, beliefs and practices

- See poster presentation on 120 rural women's beliefs and knowledge about breast cancer 2017
- See poster presentation on screening participation of 256 women in the Avera/ University of Connecticut/Haitian Ministry of Health screening and diagnostic clinic 2017
 - Engagement of private phone company (Digicel) to advertise breast cancer ultrasound clinic was helpful
- Research on knowledge and beliefs of males scheduled for 2018

Four years of small steps toward services

SCREENING: 2000+ women screened

EDUCATION AND CBE: 1589 women received CBE/SBE training

DIAGNOSTICS:

- 392 ultrasounds
- 5 clinical diagnosis -no biopsy and referred
- 53 biopsies
 - 18 biopsy positive
 - 1 death shortly after biopsy

TREATMENT

- 12 mastectomies in Grand Anse or referred to Port-au-Prince/Mirebalais
- 3 refused care
- 4 palliative care only
- 4 lost to follow up
- 54 average age of women with positive biopsy
- 96% estrogen positive

Surgical Department for 400,000 people



Anesthesia collaborators: resident Dr. Benoit and Dr. Rosenberg

- No anesthesiologist -4 nurse anesthetists
- Severely limited general anesthetics
- One general surgeon earning \$475/month
- Two reproductive health doctors
- Limited pharmaceuticals and supplies

BUT

- Haitian staff want to learn and update skills
- Volunteer US anesthesiologists work with residents who travel to Jeremie
- Appreciate needed equipment and supplies
- In November 2017 the UN OPS in collaboration with the Brazilian Ministry of Health began the complete rehabilitation of the surgery


